All admissions are on-line. Application Forms for admission are uploaded on the website. Selection of candidates is done based on an index factor calculated by the respective departments; this is on the basis of merit. Students are also selected in the Reserved Category; this list is attached separately to ensure chances for them in Higher Education. Data required by the University is sent on-line based on the information drawn from the Application Forms for admission.

Student information is available on the website. All relevant information regarding the college, notices and announcements are uploaded on the website. Marks obtained by students at all Internal examinations are entered into the college website by the teachers. On-line internal-examination results are released; marks uploaded on the website within 3 weeks of completion of the last examination. All Fees are paid on-line in the bank. Likewise fees for University Examination and Add-on courses are also remitted online.

SMS through notification gateway is sent to parents regarding low attendance and academic performance etc. Parent Teacher meetings are also held. Information is disseminated through college website, Social Network: Information to stakeholders through college website. Staff informed through SMS, Whatsapp group and verbally through meetings. Staff salary notification and generation of salary slips is done online. Staff maintains a record of leave availed of online. Finance & Accounting MIS-transaction with bank is conducted online. Ledger records are maintained electronically through Tally. Students evaluate teachers on-line through TAQ (Teaching Assessment Questionnaire) and outcome are evaluated, analyzed and computed. Likewise evaluation by parents is also available on the website.

CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 Institution has the mechanism for well-planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words While revision and upgradation of the syllabi is done at the University level, the college has a mechanism for effective, documented curriculum delivery. At the commencement of each academic year, every faculty member provides the students with individual time plans and reading lists for each course which are displayed in the classrooms. These time plans are adhered to, so that the student is able to gauge with a degree of clarity, what portion of the curriculum will be delivered within the stipulated time frame. These time plans are also preserved each year as documentation. Besides traditional lectures and seminars, infrastructure for the use of ICT in classrooms, like power point presentations, smart boards and audio-visual support are all available to make the delivery of the curriculum enabling and interesting for the students. In some departments, bridge courses or supplementary courses are held in order to make the curriculum delivery more holistic and effective. Tutorials are held with mentoring and participative learning encouraged. Internal assessment is done transparently with examined scripts shown to students. Inter-personal skills are enhanced through Value Education.

2.5.2 Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

Continuous evaluation is carried out throughout the year through regular tests, objective tests, projects, student paper presentations, seminars, quizzes etc. Routine tests are given and open book tests are conducted and much appreciated by students as critical thinking and creativity come to the fore. Some departments take regular, weekly tutorials. Remedial instruction is given to slow learners and challenged students.

Undergraduate students are encouraged to submit research paper abstracts for the English Department peerreviewed journal *Critical Imprints*. 1 student paper is then chosen for publication in the journal.

Mid-term tests and Selection examinations help to prepare the students for University Examinations. Corrected answer scripts are shown to the students for scrutiny. The teachers explain about as to how scoring by the students can be better in forthcoming examinations by expressing themselves more appropriately in response to questions.

Peer evaluation is also employed by teachers to empower and enable students to help each other particularly in areas where creative and original thinking will benefit them. Group assessment is conducted by teachers when students are assigned group presentations on curricular and co-curricular, academic topics.

The University enables students to apply for re-evaluation of University answer scripts.

2.5.3 Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

As an affiliated college, the Calcutta University calendar is adhered to. In addition to this, an Academic College Calendar is prepared and printed which contains a list of all the interactive and innovative programmes to be conducted by the college, both at the faculty and student level. Detailed schedules with dates are given for Mid-Term and Selection Examination. Students prepare for these examinations accordingly. Each member of the staff and student community receive a copy of the college calendar to enable them to plan for activities.

An IQAC Calendar is also prepared; this enumerates academic programmes and activities for quality enhancement to be held in the college. When new programmes to enable quality enhancement are offered during the course of the year, these are availed of for the benefit of the staff and students. The IQAC evaluates such activities during their meetings.

5.3.4 Meetings/activities organized by Alumni Association :

7 Meetings of the Executive Council were conducted during the course of the year. Annual General Meeting for registered members was conducted on 21.04.2018. Open Day held for NGOs and women entrepreneurs. This day is a much awaited day for both Alumnae and present students. 18 NGOs run by women and 12 women entrepreneurs displayed and sold their products, thus benefitting financially. At the College reunion held on 3 February, 2018, 105 students of yester year joined in and reminisced on their college days. Former Principals were also present. The Inter Loreto School Debate as part of the 175 years of Loreto in South Asia celebrations was organized by the Alumnae Association. 4 students from 8 Loreto schools around India participated in the school debate conducted on 4 August, 2017. An Exhibition Debate featuring eminent alumnae debates from among the alumnae of the college debated against present students on 'Conventional education cannot guarantee empowerment today on 5 August, 2017. This was a much enjoyable event.

A Seminar conducted by Max Weber-Stiftung, Germany, was organized and hosted in the college, thanks to some Alumnae. The college benefitted academically and financially.

The Admission Committee counsels prospective candidates for admission before the Application Forms for admission are released The Admissions Committee (for admissions) involves all members of the staff who co-operate and work at different levels. They also sit in at interface meetings and meet parents and students prior to admission.

Planning Board (for financial planning and implementation) involves the participation of teachers and non-teaching staff. Every grant to the college is discussed in this Board. Budgets for each department at the beginning of the academic year also form part of the discussions. The Library committee prepares and plans for the book budget with individual departments.

There is a Building Committee with members from faculty, architects, engineers, contractors and office staff to assist with the planning and execution of vertical extension of the college and planning for infrastructure associated with the new wing.

*	Curriculum Development: Curriculum is set by the University. Suggestions from the CBCS Workshop on
	Projects and Tutorials (Dept. of English) were forwarded to the University of Calcutta. Academic
	mentoring of students is done by the teachers.

Teaching and Learning: Introduction of Sociology as an elective subject was an initiative of the college. Workshops, seminars, regular use of ICT in classrooms contributed to enhancement of Teaching-Learning. The Neelu Sancheti Singhvi Memorial Lecture on a relevant topic broadens the perspective of students. A Media Lab has been furnished; this benefits the students of Journalism and Mass Communications and serves as a Language Lab for the B.Ed. students. The UGC sponsored COC Course on Human Rights and Empowerment concluded after 5 years. This course, because of its employability value, has been continued as an add-on course initiative by the college.

- Examination and Evaluation: All year round evaluation through class tests, tutorials, student seminars/presentations keeps the students in touch with their subject. It also enhances and helps students grow in confidence for University examinations. Results of internal examinations are published online. The students also receive a hard copy of the results which their parents have to sign. Parentteacher meetings are conducted for students who have low attendance and are those who have not performed well in college.
- Research and Development: The Research Cell holds regular meetings and programmes and presentations to broaden the academic perspectives through presentations of research done by students and faculty. 5 Research Cell presentations were conducted during the year.

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure /Instrumentation: New classrooms were created with an additional 4th floor; these bright and airy classrooms house the B.Ed. and M.A Courses. Computers were purchased to replace older versions. A conference room was created and furnished and an air conditioner installed therein. 2 new water coolers were introduced for students, a beautiful spacious students' common room was furnished for B.Ed. and M.A. students. A toilet for persons with disability was also constructed.
