Data required by the University is sent online based on the information drawn from the application forms for admission. All relevant information regarding the college, notices and announcements are uploaded on the website. Information to stakeholders is disseminated through the college website and social network platforms. Marks obtained by students at all internal examinations are entered into the college website by the teachers. Internal examination results are uploaded on the website within three weeks of completion of the last paper and are accessible to the students with their confidential user name and password. All fees: college, university examinations and addon courses, are remitted online. Staff salary notification and generation of salary slips is done online. Finance Accounting MIS transaction with bank is conducted online. Ledger records are maintained electronically through Tally.ERP. Attendance of students and leave record of staff is available on the website. Both students and staff have a unique username and password to assess the portal. SMS through notification gateway is sent to parents regarding low attendance and academic performance. Students evaluate teachers online through TAQ (Teaching Assessment Questionnaire) and the results are evaluated, analyzed and computed. In addition to this, a Student Departmental Survey and Departmental Performance Appraisal are also conducted online.

1.1 - Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Loreto College is affiliated to University of Calcutta and makes every effort to deliver the syllabus effectively. Detailed lesson plans and reading lists are put up on the college website and class notice boards. A timeline for the entire academic year is provided to the students. An orientation is given to students at the beginning of the academic year to clearly state the methods of curriculum delivery. Keeping the objective of academic excellence with all

and implement innovative teaching- learning methods. Access to an excellent library with digital resources, a media lab, free Wi-Fi and a computer laboratory equipped with the latest in information technology assist the teachers in preparing their lessons and lectures. Student participation is greatly encouraged and the classroom teaching is designed in a way that invites questions and critical responses. Regular internal assessments and assignments are conducted to help students connect with the curriculum. Guest lectures and talks by specialists are regularly arranged by the respective departments. Remedial teaching is carried out to support weak students. Each Department holds regular meetings to discuss the functioning of the Department and to formulate future plans. Departments maintain minute books and record books to document activities. The special activities of the college are also posted on the college website. A daily diary is maintained where the events and instructions for each day are recorded by the Principal including programmes related to effective curriculum delivery. Adequate steps are taken for the efficient and planned implementation of the curriculum. Prompt recruitment of teachers, promotion of a positive work culture, adherence to institutional vision, staff development seminars, supervision and review through departmental meetings, student-parent-faculty interface sessions as well as the Principal's meetings with the departments are some of the ways which aid in effective curriculum delivery. The different departments, with the support of the college, organise talks, national and international seminars in collaboration with UGC and other national research bodies and university departments. The seminar proceedings and publications are accessible to students, faculty members and for public circulation enabling to further research. Research is encouraged in both teachers and students. The institution also has a Dean of General Studies who ensures that elective subjects are not neglected and closely monitors the performance of students in the same. The Heads of Departments interact with the Principal on a routine basis regarding methods adopted for and progress made in curriculum delivery.

1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained

The College administration puts together a list of factors that could be improved by getting feedback and has based questionnaires on these. A userfriendly format with multiplechoice questions was incorporated. Different versions were developed to cater to different stakeholders like students, teachers, parents and alumnae. These digital questionnaires were incorporated on the website, so that maximum number of persons would have access to it and enable quick and easy digital analysis to ensure prompt response to the feedback. The questionnaires are available on the website. Students are addressed in class about this, the purpose and the rationale are explained to them, details regarding the mode of accessing the questionnaire are given and then they are left to fill in their responses by themselves. They are also informed about their responsibility to give constructive feedback. Students are also asked to communicate with their parents and guardians and to request them to fill in the questionnaire specifically formulated for them. The Department takes every measure to ensure that the feedback received is anonymous and that students can respond freely without any observation or supervision by teachers. Students fill in data using their confidential password. It is therefore not possible for anyone to view students' responses. Then the data is collated with the help of specially programmed software. Thus the anonymity of the respondents is assured to make the data more authentic and credible. The data filled in the questionnaires is collected digitally by ICT professionals. This helps to keep the information derived from different groups of stakeholders distinct and separate. Different items of each questionnaire are calculated and percentages are arrived at via statistical analysis. These percentages, recording responses to each option of each item of individual questionnaires are communicated by email to the heads of the relevant departments. There are three kinds of survey reports - TAQ (Teaching Assessment Questionnaire), Student Departmental Survey and Departmental Performance Appraisal. The statistical analysis is provided by the institution to the Department or to the concerned teachers in the case of TAQs. The Heads of Department convene a meeting with the faculty members of their discipline. The data from the questionnaires is examined and discussed. The members of the department together arrive at ways of dealing with issues that emerge in the survey. Next, the faculty meets the Principal and apprises her of these matters and the steps they propose to take. With the help and guidance of the Principal, the concerns expressed by the stakeholders are addressed promptly and effectively. The management addresses administrative issues where improvement may be required. The action on the feedback is taken within one to three weeks.

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2.3.2 - Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

The practice of 'Mentoring' is an important aspect of life at Loreto College. Mentoring is carried out by all the teachers of the various departments in order to encourage and assist students in matters beyond academics. Students today are exposed to undue emotional and physical stress which tends to affect their overall health and well being. Students often feel awkward to seek professional help for their concerns due to inhibitions or are simply confused as to whom to approach. In such situations it is important that students have someone who can guide them on the right path and help them address their issues in the most effective way possible. The objective of the Mentoring programme is to give students access to immediate assistance. Each student is assigned a mentor and the ratio of mentor mentee is roughly 1:21. The mentor and mentees meet regularly and an official record of these meetings is maintained. The mentoring sessions are an open unbiased platform for the students to voice their concerns and apprehensions about their personal and academic issues. Based on the trepidations expressed by the students they are advised on the best course of action by the mentor or are further referred to the College counsellor if there is need for professional assistance. Besides conducting mentoring sessions at regular intervals the mentors maintain an open channel of communication whereby the mentee can approach the mentor at any point of time for assistance. Establishing a relationship outside the formal classroom setting allows teachers to provide additional attention to students and their issues. The encouragement and assistance of the mentors helps nurture the ambitions and aspirations of the students and infuse them with the positivity and drive essential to overcome all obstacles. The mentoring sessions also help normalize conversations around issues which may seem unapproachable to the mentees thus building a relationship of confidence and respect between the mentor and mentee. The mentoring programme does not only benefit the mentee. By stepping into the role of a mentor, teachers are exposed to a host of problems encountered by the young generation today. It is important for teachers to grow and adapt to the changing times in order to connect with and reach out to students.

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2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The college follows the modalities of conducting the Continuous Internal Evaluation as prescribed by the University of Calcutta. In the last five years there have been some changes in the mode of evaluation based on the type of programme (111 or CBCS). For the Three Year Annual System Undergraduate Programme (20142019) emphasis is on Selection Examinations conducted roughly 2 months before the students' final University Examinations. The students' performance on this examination along with their regularity of attendance (minimum 75) determines whether or not the student can appear for the final examination. Apart from this, group projects and presentations which aim at fostering peer learning and mentoring are also encouraged all through the year. Tutorials are held at regular intervals by all teachers to assess learning outcome. Evaluation in a continuous mode has helped improve student regularity and participation in practicals as there are marks for each class attended and assignments completed. Each department has worked out the details of how the CIE will be carried out for each paper, taking care that learning objectives of each paper are achieved through the different assignments. The assignments are designed such that they not only test the knowledge base of the students but also prepare them for time management during examinations. CIE is used as a method of assessing whether learning outcomes for all courses are being achieved. It provides an opportunity to relook at and modify teaching strategies if the students are not performing well.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The college follows the academic calendar of the University of Calcutta. In the annual system, every new academic year begins in July and ends in June. The University sends schedules of undergraduate, postgraduate and B.Ed. examinations ahead of time. The Calendar Committee of the college consults the calendar provided by the University to finalize the college calendar. The Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) process of the college is scheduled coordinated with the University calendar of final projects, vivavoce, practical examinations, internals. The examination dates are marked on the calendar with important college events and holidays The college calendar is uploaded on the college website at the beginning of each academic year. Copies of college calendar are given to teaching and non teaching staff of the college and the students. The dates for the publication of results are not mentioned in the college calendar, the results are published within three weeks from the date the internal examination ended. Teachers regularly consult the college calendar to confirm the availability of a date before setting tests and assignments.

There are a number of committees to ensure that physical, academic and support facilities are maintained. AMCs for all computers including Library automation and servers as well as maintenance contracts for water coolers and Aqua Guard are dealt with. Loreto College has the following Departments offering UG Courses: English, Geography, History, Political Science, Education, Psychology, Economics, Journalism and Mass Communication, Mathematics, Human Rights, Sociology, Bengali, Hindi, and Film Studies, Computer Department. The Institution also offers B.Ed. course and Post Graduation in English. Each Department has been allotted classrooms with adequate seating arrangement for students as well as for teachers. Each classroom has a white board mounted on the wall. A total of 14 Smartboards including ICT in the Concert Hall has been set up. The institution is well equipped with a total of 10 movable Projectors. The institution provides each Department as well as the IQAC Coordinator and PG Convenor with a personalized laptop. At present there are 32 laptops. The institution also has a total of 55 Desktops ICT facilities are frequently used both by faculty members as well as students. There are 4 laboratories set up within the institution. There are internet facilities which include both WiFi and Broadband services. Other physical facilities available in the institution include: Printers : 10 Scanners: 4 Cameras: 3 Pen drives: 9 Hard disc/Hard drives: 2 Whiteboards: 1 Splitter: 1 GIS software has been installed in a total of 6 laptops and 12 desktops (Department of Geography) The Institution has adequate facilities for sports, games (indoor, outdoor), gymnasium, yoga centre etc. and cultural activities Sports Facilities: The College has a lawn which is spacious enough to hold athletics events such as shot put and discus. There is a common room cumsports room with adequate furniture for storage of sports equipment. The college also shares a badminton, throwball and basketball court with the school. Indoor sports facilities are available like chess, carom, table tennis, scrabble etc. All students of the college are members of the Games Society and participate in various intercollege, state, national and interuniversity competitions for basketball, badminton, chess etc. They participate in sport festivals of other colleges, IITs and Universities. The college has gymnasium equipment such as tread mills, twister, exercising cycles. The Games Society has a faculty member as staff advisor and student representatives who plan and execute the events of their society. Students actively participate in intra and inter college events throughout the year and bring several laurels to the college. Cultural Activities: Cultural activities are conducted either in the Concert Hall or Auditorium. Yoga: Yoga is practiced by the students of the B.Ed. Department. The practice of assimilating the faculties of mind and body and harnessing energy for better growth has now found its place and importance throughout the world. In the course, the students learn the Asanas with stepbystep guidance of how each pose is done, along with precautions and benefits of each pose. The Asanas include the Padmasana, Bhujangasana, Trikonasana, Vriksasana.

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5.3.2 – Activity of Student Council & representation of students on academic & administrative bodies/committees of the institution (maximum 500 words)

Loreto College has a democratically elected Student Council consisting of members elected by and from among the student body. It is headed by a Student President and VicePresident, and also comprises the Class Representatives and SubRepresentatives of each Department (including the PG Department of English and the B.Ed. Department), all of whom are elected from the final year class. There are 20 functioning societies in the college that enrich the social, cultural, corporate and cocurricular life of the college, while facilitating multifaceted development of students. Each society is headed by a President and VicePresident elected from the third years, and a Treasurer elected from second years. The societies function under the guidance of staff advisors from among the faculty, while the Student Council as a whole functions under the direct guidance of the Principal. Once constituted, the Council takes a formal oath of office received by the Principal on the day of the Annual Investiture Ceremony. The specific role and activities of the Student Council are as follows: • Conducts an orientation for new first year students. • Spots talent and organize auditions for students so as to enable them to participate in intercollege and intracollege events, competitions and activities. • Organizes intercollege and intracollege events, activities and competitions through the respective societies. • Organizes and performs in cultural programmes such as

Teachers' Day, Farewell to outgoing batch of students or teachers, Freshers' Welcome etc. • Organizes and performs in programmes held in commemoration of National Days like Independence Day, Gandhi Jayanti etc. • Student Council is the main architect of the annual intercollege festival, Samagam, for which they organize sponsorship and see to the logistics of the various activities. • Each society head presents the Annual Society Report while the Student President and Vice President read out the Student Council Report, at the end of the third year academic calendar. • The President and Vice President also present the Annual College Report during the Awards Ceremony. • Apart from the above, the Student Council assists in every college programme, academic and nonacademic, as volunteers, ushers, looking into hospitality arrangements, etc. Academic and Administrative Bodies that have Student Representatives: • Unfair Means, Vigilance - Student President and Vice President • IQAC (Internal Quality Assurance Cell) - Student President and Vice President • AntiRagging Cell • Student Welfare and Grievance Redressal Cell

The Loreto College Alumnae Association was registered under the West Bengal Registrar of Societies in 2000. The registered address of the Association is 7 Middleton Row, Kolkata 700071. As per its Constitution, the Loreto College Alumnae Association has an Executive Committee that acts as the working committee and comprises of 17 members. The Principal of the college is the exofficio President. There is also an Honorary VicePresident, Honorary Secretary, Honorary Joint Secretary, Honorary Treasurer and Honorary Joint Treasurer. Besides the office bearers there are executive committee members, two of whom are coopted every year. As per the Constitution, the VicePresident, Secretary and Treasurer retire every year along with the coopted members. The Secretary conducts and chairs meetings of the Executive Committee regularly and all decisions regarding the functioning of the Association are taken during these meetings. The Alumnae Association holds an Annual General Meeting every year during which the required number of Executive Committee members retire and new members are nominated to join the committee. The Association charges a Life Membership fee of Rs 550 from all those who wish to be registered members. Of this, Rs 50 is charged as Registration fee and Rs 500 as membership fees. All accounts are audited by a registered chartered accountant and auditing firm. The Association organizes an Annual Reunion and contributes to college life in several ways including providing assistance during Open Day and other activities. It also gives a prize to the best General Course student on Awards Day.

An Open Day was held for NGOs and women entrepreneurs. This day is a much awaited day for both Alumnae and present students. 16 NGOs run by women and 12 women entrepreneurs displayed and sold their products, thus benefitting financially. CRITERION VI – GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

6.1 - Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 – Mention two practices of decentralization and participative management during the last year (maximum 500 words)

The college was awarded a grant by RUSA, when a Planning Board was instituted with the Principal in the Chair and some members of the faculty and accounts staff. For the utilization of funds and other finances from different funding bodies, the Planning Board meets and discusses for proper fund utilization. For the purchase of books and ejournals, the Library Committee places before the Heads of Departments, who consult the faculty members for the choice of books to be purchased. The Monitoring Board of the college which includes faculty, working along with the Planning Board to have an overview of the work undertaken out of the funds allocated to the college, help ensure completion of the expenditure appropriately and planning further. Likewise, the Planning and Monitoring Boards work in unison for proper allotment of funds to different Departments, as needed, especially so with books and laboratory equipment for the new CBCS system introduced by the University of Calcutta. There is a Building Committee consisting of the Principal, members of faculty, a chief architect, engineers, contractors and office staff to assist with the planning and execution of the vertical extension of the college on the fourth floor. Building Committee meetings are held frequently to ascertain the progress of the construction. The contractors participate in the meetings and inform the committee members of the challenges faced. Suggestions are made and queries are addressed regarding the pace and quality of the construction. The Principal often consults faculty members regarding their requirements for new classrooms. For instance, the members of the Psychology Department were consulted regarding the construction of new classrooms for a proposed Masters programme in Psychology to be started in the next few years. The architect makes necessary suggestions taking cognizance of the fact that space is limited and that the college is housed in a heritage property. The accountant presents bills related to construction and the committee members examine these. The supervisor of the support staff is also a member of the Building Committee and offers suggestions or points out possible daily problems in plumbing or electrical connections that might surface during construction.

Best Practice #1: Title of the Practice: Green initiatives The Practice: A holistic education is imperative to create socially responsible individuals. Higher education cannot limit itself to merely providing academic training. It is important that students are made aware of their duties and responsibilities towards society and the world at large. Being sensitive and responsive to the environment is a trait that has to be inculcated in children at a young age in school and be reinforced at the level of higher education. To set an example and inspire all stakeholders to opt for environment friendly alternatives, Loreto College has initiated the following practices: • Solar energy • Rainwater harvesting • Vermi composting • Saving paper • Herbal garden • E waste management Best Practice #2: Title of the Practice : Value Education The Practice: The Principal of the College conducts Value Education classes once a week throughout each academic year with every batch of students ranging from the undergraduates to the post graduate and B.Ed students. It has become imperative to include Value Education in the context of higher education in India to impart life skills to technologically competent but often spiritually and emotionally impoverished students, who despite their academic credentials, find it difficult to cope with real life situations. Value Education classes emphasize the need for a commitment to integrity, care, respect, discipline and discernment while teaching soft skills like decision making, participating in group discussions and communication strategies. It also teaches life skills to cope with gender issues, compatibility in family life and coping with anger and stress. These classes stress on the need for morals and ethics in a commercially driven and material world where one is likely to face unscrupulous colleagues or associates.

7.3 - Institutional Distinctiveness

The founder's vision was to empower women to take charge of the future and make a difference in the world. An extension of that commitment, Loreto College, Kolkata is proud of its contribution to society in nurturing women of substance and compassion in the 107 years of its existence. The creative and sensitive approach of the College coupled with the desire to accommodate change helps create an environment conducive for the holistic development of students. While the College encourages academic excellence it lays great emphasis on personality development and community service. The aim of empowerment is not just to help students realise their privileged position but to also educate them on how to utilize their privilege to alleviate the suffering of others. Values and concern for the community can never be taught, they are imbibed through example and practice. Therefore through its own ingenious ways, the College tries to inculcate these values in students. Some of the established practices of the College in this regard are: • Value education: The Principal of the College conducts weekly Value Education classes throughout the year with every batch. The objective of these classes is to impart life and soft skills which help the students stand out in the world of mechanical learning and working processes. • Social Service Society and NSS: There is an active Social Service Society which along with the NSS acts as the perfect platform for students to reach out to society at large. By organising blood donation camps, cleaning campaigns under Swachh Bharat Abhiyan and visits to NGOs these societies encourage participation from students. Mandatory Social Service is a compulsory aspect of the curriculum for final year students. • Inclusive Education: Providing equal access to the differentlyabled is a priority of the College. The College is now a barrier free campus with the installation of ramps, construction of special washrooms, upgradation of lift facilities and availability of writers and sound recorders for the visuallychallenged. In this regard special mention ought to be made of Kalakriti, a special programme organized by the Psychology Department each year to showcase the talents of the differentlyabled and provide a forum for theoretical discussions on inclusive education. • The Loreto College Womens Cell: The Women's Cell of the College was founded in September 1996 to provide free nonformal education to young women who have had no opportunity to go to school. With the main thrust being adult literacy, teachers comprising college staff, retired staff, alumnae and friends offer voluntary service in the Womens Cell to help students who had dropped out from school, to pass the board exams through the National Indian Open School. • A Public Speaking Course for SC, ST and Minority community students is held to impart selfconfidence in students coming from lessprivileged homes and for first generation learners.

8. Future Plans of Actions for Next Academic Year

In order to grow with the changing needs of the times, Loreto College tries its best to stay abreast with the latest developments in the teachinglearning sphere and attempts to upgrade infrastructural facilities in a timely manner. Some of the efforts in this regard are: • The College is in the process of applying for autonomy and hopes to complete all necessary steps as soon as possible.

Infrastructural facilities are being prepared for the same. • As part of its academic expansion, and in order to attract more students, the College is considering the prospect of offering courses in Sociology Honours and Masters in Psychology and relevant electives such as Gender Studies, Editing and Publishing with the introduction of autonomy. Infrastructure for this is in the process of being prepared. • Considering the demand for Mathematics teachers, the college is planning to apply to the University for this subject as a school teaching subject for the B.Ed. Department. • The College wishes to recruit more teachers in substantive posts for stability and intends on pursuing the matter with the Department of Higher Education. • New enrichment courses such as the addon course, Preparation for Competitive Examinations are part of the expansion process. • New student development programmes are being considered for the betterment of all students. Recognizing the importance of onthejob training, the College wishes to enable and encourage students to pursue internships. • Staff Development Programmes for the nonteaching and support staff are being conceptualized to help with their growth in a personal and professional capacity. • The College is in the process of enhancing the available ICT facilities, both software and hardware, so as to upgrade ICT facilities to aid both teachers and students in the teachinglearning process. • Cantilever classrooms: To utilize the limited ground space in the best possible way a cantilever system has been planned to increase the number of classrooms. • To enhance the ambience in an ecofriendly manner, the college plans to landscape the open space in the college and provide drip irrigation to the trees and plants. • Rainwater harvesting: Considering the high rise buildings in the radius of the College, efforts at working towards the creation of an infrastructure to facilitate rainwater harvesting on a large scale and position storm water drains all along the surface of the large terrace to collect rainwater. An underground tank has already been built for this purpose. • To ensure safety for all in the College campus, Fire Security equipment is being installed on the premises.
