This facilitated addressing issues of student diversity and different social and cultural backgrounds. A range of short duration certificate and add -on courses were conducted like Spanish, Basic Mathematics for Competitive Exams, Self-defence, Piano and IIM-Bootcamp which were not part of the curriculum.

15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

- *Interdisciplinary Webinar Contexts, Curriculum and Institutions: Social Sciences in Universities in India*, organized by the Department of Sociology and the Department of Education, and approved by IQAC, Loreto College
- A Webinar titled *APA Style Research paper Referencing and Formatting* was organized by the Department of Psychology, Loreto College in collaboration with the IQAC, Loreto College. The participants were from the Departments of Psychology, Education and B.Ed.
- *Young India Fellowship* was conducted by the Outreach office of Ashoka University, Delhi focused on exposure to multidisciplinary thoughts through inspiring faculty, diverse peers, mentorship and experimental learning. The students were given an overview of the whole programme emphasising the different multidisciplinary courses offered, the opportunities and placement options, the success stories, the eligibility criteria along with the financial aid programme and the procedure of application.

16. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The College is yet to register with the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC). Affiliated to the University of Calcutta, our degree-giving institution, we await a directive from our parent body to register for the ABC portal. We are eager to take advantage of this great initiative by the UGC and promote flexibility for students. Once we receive the directive, we will act swiftly to ensure our registration is complete. This endeavour will undoubtedly benefit students in the long run.

17. Skill development:

Add-on courses have enhanced skill-development in addition to the gits and talents and creativity that our students have been able to hone while in college

- Editing and Publishing Enrichment Course has empowered students who have obtained employment in the field for which they have trained, even in dramatics.
- Calligraphy and Cursive Writing have been foundational for our pupils in creative media and advertising and personality depiction.
- Honing entrepreneurial skills and transforming hobbies and talents for employment and employment generation.
- Self - defence has empowered the students not just in self-protection, but also in coming to others' assistance.
- Mock Newsroom has enabled our pupils in speech delivery and

communication skills.

- French and Spanish has motivated our pupils to take on advanced course in the foreign language that they are initiated into for career prospects and further study courses.
- The Debating Society of Loreto College, Kolkata organised the first edition of its National level debating competition- Vivaad . The motion was - "This house believes that Social Media has been unjustly persecuted for the indiscretion of its users." . Students from 15 colleges/ universities from Kolkata, Delhi and Bangalore participated in the event.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

- The Partition of India, 1947: Continuities, Legacies and Silences - The Department of English and the Department of Bengali, in collaboration with the Literary Society of Loreto College. There were presentations by students which highlighted a distinct aspect of the 1947 Partition, drawing on sources such as literature, film, and visual iconography. The event also included an enriching exhibition on the theme of Partition, conceptualised and created by the students. Various Partition narratives, interviews, and precious items such as coins, statues, and stamps from both sides of the border were on display.
- English department of Loreto College study trip to the Natya Shodh Sansthan Theatre Museum, Kolkata. The museum is India's largest repository of archival material and documentation covering the entire history of Indian Theatre and includes dedicated galleries on Sanskrit, Folk, and Modern Theatre. The trip was organised to enhance the students' understanding of Indian Theatre for their course on 'Text and Performance'
- The National Service Scheme Society of Loreto College, Kolkata in collaboration with IQAC organized a web talk on Immunoboosters in Siddha Medicine to create awareness on natural ways to promote immunity on December 15, 2021. The resource person for the web talk was Dr N. Abdul Azees, MD (Siddha) , Siddha and Varmam Specialist, Maria Siddha College, Coimbatore, Tamil Nadu. Dr Azees illuminated the audience with information on the Siddha medicine - a traditional system of healing that originated in South India and is considered to be one of India's oldest systems of medicine.

19.Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

- Basic Mathematics for Competitive Exams Enrichment Course – Structured to meet the demands of preliminary stage Mathematics for any Government competitive examinations. The objective is to help students acquire skills in solving quantitative aptitude by simple methods.
- Geography Field Trip to Lateybunga, Shashbani, Dhari Tehsil, Nainital District, Uttarakhand for enhancing skills in data collection and analysis
- Human Relations Field Visit – As an introduction to HR as a career option Department of Psychology
- Visit to South Park Street Scottish Cemetery and Nursery- For a practical understanding of Scottish Literature and Poetry and learning the skills of nurturing plants Department of English
- Social Service undertaken by Third Year students- for sensitizing students to respond to the needs of the underprivileged in community
- Building Entrepreneurship Mindset – Interactive sessions organized by the Loreto College Incubation Centre (LCIC) in collaboration with IIM Calcutta Innovation Park. The session focused on how and why should one become an entrepreneur and spoke about the role of an entrepreneur and helped students gain an insight into what it takes to plan and execute a successful start-up.

20. Distance education/online education:

- Loreto College Alumnae Association facilitated a Bootcamp- Certificate Course on Career Aspirants & Decision-making conducted by IIM Shillong for 76 past and present students of Loreto College Kolkata from February 25 to March 6, 2022. This course was designed as a capsule of the different dimensions of management. This initiative was immensely insightful and helped in changing the perceptions of the participants as they were mostly from the liberal arts and social science background. This exposure to management as a career option has borne fruit.
- IIT Spoken Tutorial- a collaboration with IIT Powai and Loreto College wherin students undertook training in Libre Office Writer and obtained certificates. This enhances their computing skills.

1.1.1 - The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process	
<p>Upholding the Vision of Loreto College, the teaching – learning process aims at achieving academic excellence and empowerment of students. The college is affiliated to University of Calcutta; it strives to incorporate relevant content beyond the set curriculum. The flexibility to opt from a range of subjects is facilitated under the CBCS system.</p> <p>The faculty have adopted interactive student – centric methods, which aims at achieving the Learning Objectives stated at the outset of each semester. The Central and Department Seminar libraries are a storehouse of both books and e-resources which are accessible to the students. The previous years' University examination question papers, uploaded department-wise on the college website enables weak students to prepare for exams as per expected norms. Continuous internal assessments-tutorials, term papers and presentations individual and a group-wise are conducted; team spirit is reflected during student academic presentations at the formal platform of Research Cell events, organized for faculty and students. Regular mentoring and remedial classes help identify learning gaps and address these for advanced and slow learners.</p> <p>A structured system motivated by the Principal ensures decentralization and smooth functioning of the institution. Regular department meetings ensure monitoring of the implementation of curriculum delivery and organize allied events. Interface meetings of faculty and parents and orientation for new entrants encourage active participation of all stakeholders.</p>

1.1.2 - The institution adheres to the academic calendar including for the conduct of Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE)

Loreto College, affiliated to University of Calcutta adheres to the Academic Calendar and University examination schedule declared in the website. Under the CBCS system for undergraduate students, continuous internal assessments were conducted by all the departments as are University Internal examinations. The roster for the same is prepared by the respective departments and shared with the students. Internal and external examiners are appointed by the University for practical courses like Geography, Psychology and Education and Head examiners across various departments from Loreto College, ensured that the examinations were conducted smoothly and the evaluation and scrutiny of all the scripts appropriately undertaken.

The post graduate department of English assessed students on the basis of continuous academic assessment. This was carried out through written class and home assignments, group discussions, paper presentations and debates.

Formative and summative assessments were conducted by the Department of B.Ed. through tutorials, paper presentations and projects both theory and practicum, and internal examinations at the end of the semester.

Assessment of teacher-trainees during school internship by teacher educators formed an integral part of the course. External examiners appointed by the University conducted practical examinations both at the B.Ed and undergraduate level and assessed the students through viva voce.

The underlying philosophy of higher education at Loreto College instils professional ethics which include values like integrity, honesty, transparency and mutual respect. 2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organizes special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

The institution makes a conscious effort not to create any academic distinction in students and label them as particular types of learners. Aware of general scholastic abilities of students. Bridge Courses are scientifically designed for the First Year students to facilitate transition from school to higher education.

Every new semester cycle, each department forms groups of mentees who are allotted a particular professor-in-charge for mentoring with a mentor: mentee ratio 1:6 ensure that a patient hearing is given to challenges faced by students, opening avenues to resolve the same. Remedial classes are conducted regularly for the slow learners. They are encouraged to spend time reading in libraries outside the class hours. Under the CBCS system, one tutorial period per week to understand the strengths and weaknesses of the students for each course is mandatory

Advanced learners are motivated to undertake research projects

and publish them independently in renowned journals. Initiatives like a Boot Camp in collaboration with IIM Shillong witnessed large number of student registrations and imparted managerial and employability skills. Special programmes for advanced learners like higher studies have disseminated information on the nuances of pursuing education overseas and in premier institutes in India.

The IQAC-initiated Loreto LEADS facilitated interaction with bureaucrats and corporate personalities to impart professionalism, employability skills and career counseling.

2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 - Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Loreto education believes that learning is a social and experiential process. It promotes the value that it is a classroom environment in which students can learn to think critically and solve real world problems. Teachers act as a catalyst and help students to work toward their goals and incorporate new knowledge and skills that add to their range of learning experiences. Peer-teaching, term papers, wall journals, debates on contemporary issues, quiz and mental maps are some of the common methods used across departments to make learning student-centric. QuarkXPress, a desktop publishing software is used by the Department of Journalism & Mass Communication which assists students to write reports.

The Department of Geography incorporates experiential learning pedagogy as it organizes field visits to remote locations and provides a platform for students to learn from real life experiences. Heritage walks are undertaken by the Departments of History and English

Inclusive education is promoted by organizing events like Kalakriti, hosted by the Department of Psychology which provides a platform to differently-abled children to showcase their

talent. Collaborations with organizations like MENTAID and Shruti Disability Centre are encouraged as they impart educational and vocational training to the differently-abled. B.Ed. students undertake experiential practice teaching in schools and initiate internships with the underprivileged.

2.3.2 - Teachers use ICT enabled tools for effective teaching-learning process. Write description in maximum of 200 words

ICT has led to a new student-learning and modified teaching methods. Mobile learning (m-learning) as a form of e-learning is used for sharing course materials and access to digital library. The hybrid mode of teaching adopted post- pandemic was effective due to ease of holding interactive classes through Google classroom, post study material, assignments and adapt to innovative methods like crosswords and quiz. This was possible due to an upgraded WiFi in the campus with a suitable bandwidth. The department laptops were WiFi- enabled which ensured that the faculty were able to take uninterrupted classes and enhance syllabi delivery. Assignments were conducted through Google forms in different formats, were evaluated and returned by teachers.

ICT in education helps the students to compete in the global economy by becoming part of a skilled workforce. In Loreto all students enroll for the IIT Spoken Tutorial and Geography students enlist for IIT Bombay Software Training Student Development Programme on QGIS. These certifications open up better opportunities for students progressing to higher education.

Workshops on Research Methodology organized by the Departments of Geography Psychology and Political Science contributed to the enhancement of research skills of students and faculty. Webinars were organized on IPR, inclusiveness, gender equity, career options and IQAC-initiated International Lecture Series on Environmental Sustainability to strive towards the sustainable development goals. Collaboration with International Union for Conservation of Nature enabled the students and faculty to interact with Lead authors of IPCC.

2.5 - Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 - Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode. Write description within 200 words.

Affiliated to the University of Calcutta, Loreto College conducts the Internal assessments as per the prescribed directives. The Principal in consultation with the teachers discuss the nuances of smooth conduction of the examinations at a staff meeting each Semester. The Heads of Department accordingly prepare a roster and share it with the students at least two weeks in advance.

Continuous Internal Evaluation as per the teaching plans discussed at the commencement of each semester is conducted in form of tutorials, presentations, term papers, assignments, and projects. Evaluated assignments are shared with students and teachers who discuss the areas which require improvement at an individual level. Students are encouraged to clarify their doubts and resubmit the modified assignments. This ensures that the specified learning outcomes and programme specific outcomes are attained.

Originality and creativity are promoted by the faculty. The students are regularly briefed on Copyright laws and plagiarism guidelines. Research papers are screened and evaluated as per plagiarism-detecting software, which streamlines and adds to a repository of scholarly articles.

Open-ended application-based topics are chosen for Term Papers/Assignments to evoke creativity and originality and higher-order thinking among students. This tests background reading and proactive ability of expression in students

2.5.2 - Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

Loreto College has an active Students' Council which acts as a platform for interaction between students, teachers and management. The students communicate their grievances regarding any academic issue to the Heads of the Department. The issue in most cases is resolved at the department level. In case of modifications needed in the marks obtained, the changes are incorporated online within a stipulated time period of three weeks.

Unfair Means Committee and Internal Complaints Committee settle related grievances as per the prescribed guidelines.

Internal examinations as per the CBCS system are conducted at the end of every semester and marks are uploaded into the University portal. In case of grievances with respect to University examinations, the college offers guidance about the procedures to register a complaint. The students are explained the difference between a Review and RTI, which helps them to seek relevant redressal. However, the college does not have the authority to either follow up or ensure time bound results from the University.

Drafts of internal assessment term papers are corrected and any misgivings are settled before the final submission date.

The Time plans of individual teachers - course and Semester-wise incorporates the method of assessment which is discussed with the students. These are displayed in the classrooms and website. Each course elaborates its nature and specifies the outcomes that are to be accomplished. Different methods are executed to assess the students over the duration of the programme. The performance of students in the Internal examinations conducted prior to the final University examinations, acts as a precursor and enables the teachers to conduct remedial classes for below-average performers. Each department guides students to appear for competitive and entrance examinations. Records of student progression to institutions of higher education and Placement details are maintained.

Students are motivated to participate in mock parliaments, debates, quizzes, essay competitions, and presentation of papers in intra-/intercollege events. These are platforms wherein the skills imparted by the college come to the forefront.

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1 - Physical Facilities

4.1.1 - The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching-learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

Committed to provide holistic development of the students, the college has strived to maintain a upgraded and functional infrastructure. Wireless internet connection has been installed in all the computers and laptops which enable access of content from the web. The speed of the AIRTEL Leased-Line Connectivity (8Mbps) and Alliance Broadband Connectivity (512Mbps) has promoted a digital learning environment, especially for the Geography and Psychology laboratories which engage in teaching softwares like GIS and SPSS. Updated GPS devices and meteorological instruments have been procured to impart quality education and equip graduates with employability skills. Quark Express software is installed in eleven computers in the Media lab which assists journalism students in curriculum.

The classrooms are equipped with smartboards and high resolution overhead projector which facilitates the teaching-learning process. The Concert Hall and auditorium also have mounted projectors. The Central library conducts orientation for the new entrants to appraise them on the facilities offered and rules for the maintenance of the same. Each department has a Seminar library which caters to discipline-specific material, particularly Journals, Census Reports and Statistical handbooks. Detailed Teaching Plans are displayed in the departments highlighting the Learning Objectives and Outcomes. The air-conditioned auditorium and concert hall provide facilities for both online and hybrid webinars.

Outdoor sports like kho - kho, shot put, long jump, high jump, and relays are held in the college lawn. The Games Society organizes the Teacher-Student Inter-Department Badminton Tournament which promotes active participation and team spirit.

The college calendar is dotted with various cultural programmes indicating a vibrant ethos. The members of the Eastern and Western Culture, Dramatics, AICUF societies and SPICMACAY hosts and participates in various intra and inter- college events. The Annual Fest Samagam offers a platform to showcase the talents of youth in the field of music and dance. Rabindra Jayanti is celebrated in a special way in Loreto, hosted by the teaching and administrative staff, as a tribute to Rabindranath Tagore through presentation of rendition of Gurudev's songs, dances and plays for the students. These events are held in the Concert Hall (3175 sq.ft) and Auditorium (1890 sq.ft), having a capacity of 400 and 250 respectively. The college has two Grand pianos and one cottage piano. Guitars, drums, keyboards, harmoniums and tablas lend melody to cultural programmes.

Yoga is offered as a course to B.Ed students and International Yoga Day is celebrated by students demonstrating yogasanas, a key to wellness.

4.2 - Library as a Learning Resource

Loreto College Library is a fully-equipped lending library which provides information to all who wish to pursue self-learning. It supports the teaching-learning and research activities of the College by providing information resources in an appropriate range of formats, suitable study space and efficient user-focused services.

The collection comprises books, e-books, e-journals, print journals, CDs & DVDs, and e-resources from NLIST-IFLIBNET.

Books from the Collection are housed in the Central Library, Post-graduate and the Department Libraries. All books are processed in the Central Library.

Library Automation Library automation started with creation of a database of its holdings using CDS/ISIS for Windows (WINISIS) software, from which it moved on to ILMS LIBSYS in 2004. Retro-conversion of holdings were barcoded and Membership cards issued-2005.

Since 2013 the College Library is fully-computerized with integrated open-source LMS Koha version 3.22.01.000 running on Ubuntu 14 platform, integrated with the RFID system comprising Integrated Self-check in Check-out Kiosk; Book drop Station;

Security Gates with all accessories; Multipurpose RFID Staff Work Station; Portable Shelf Management Reader/ Inventory System and accessories through a middleware NISO NCIP RFID Server Software Layer.

An IBM rack server has been installed with Xeon Silver Processor, 64 GB RAM, and 2TB SAS hard disk drive space for RFID middleware. Xeon Silver Processor, 16 GB RAM, and 300 GB hard disk drive space for KOHA software and DSPACE. KOHA version upgraded to 21.11.01.00. and DSPACE upgraded to version 6.3. RFID middleware has been upgraded, compatible with upgraded KOHA software.

The internet security has been upgraded by installing an additional 100 user Sonicwall FortiGATEdevice for protection against virus, spam, intrusion and traffic.

360 degrees camera and a DSLR camera with accessories enable offline and online webinars, seminars through live streaming in the classroom, laboratory, auditorium and concert hall to bring the best of the academic world to the staff and students.

6.2.2 - The functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment and service rules, procedures, etc.

The Governing Body is the apex decision-making authority, comprising the Province Leader (President), the Principal (Secretary), Sisters from the Loreto Community, a Jesuit academician, representatives from the teaching and non-teaching categories, alumnae and a parent representative.

The Principal is the administrative head and works in close association with the Academic and Administrative Officer to ensure academic conduct and administration. The Principal ensures that routine operations are properly conducted, through interactions and meetings with all stakeholders. The Societies for co-curricular activities organize events which are aimed at enhancing the overall development of students under the guidance of the Staff Advisors. The Student Council represents the opinion of the students in important matters of the college.

Administrative posts like the Bursar, IQAC Coordinator, Officer-in-Charge of Examinations, Dean of General Students and Convener of the Post Graduate Section are delegated responsibilities in administrative matter. The Staff representatives act as a bridge between the staff and the Principal. They hold regular meetings to ensure smooth conduct of University examinations and Staff matters. The Librarians are assisted by Helpers for the Central and B.Ed libraries.

The Planning and Monitoring Boards look into the financial matters. The Internal Complaints Committee and the Anti-Ragging Cell deal with grievances of students.

6.3.5 - Institutions Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non- teaching staff

A reliable Performance Appraisal system plays an integral part in the improvement of the organization. Questionnaires and Feedback forms have been designed for each of the stakeholders, i.e. students, teachers, alumnae and employers. The Teachers Assessment Questionnaire (TAQ) is submitted online by students of all departments annually. The appraisal is anonymous and the feedback of the students is calculated statistically. These scores aid in the computation of an overall index of teaching efficiency and are visually represented by cartographic techniques for each department. The TAQs are analyzed by the Principal with each teacher and the strengths and challenges are addressed. This dialogue facilitates identifying areas which need improvement and enhances the quality of teaching- learning.

The institution follows the Performance Based Appraisal System (PBAS) suggested by the Department of Higher Education, Government of West Bengal. The Academic Performance Indices (API) are calculated by the faculty as per the performa at the end of the academic year. These scores are integral for their career advancements and promotions. In addition to these, there are the Student Satisfaction Survey, Students' Feedback on Syllabus, Teachers' Feedback on Syllabus and the Alumnae Feedback on Syllabus questionnaires which are uploaded in the college website.

6.4 - Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

Loreto College is aided by the Government of West Bengal, thus a Government Auditor appointed by their Audit Department conducts the external financial audit. The Audit Report is placed by the Secretary of the Loreto College Provident Fund Trust (LCPFT) at the Annual General Meeting. The Provident Fund receipts of the individual members are distributed at the AGM.

The College conducts internal and external audits regularly. The Annual Accounts is prepared at the culmination of the financial year on March 31 according to the guidelines of The Department of Higher Education, Government of West Bengal and is the

systematic examination of the accounts by the government auditor followed by a physical verification of the inventory like documents and vouchers and assets (fixed and movable). The internal audit recommends ways to improve the institution's financial (recurring and non-recurring) and administrative infrastructure. The Internal Auditor appointed by the Bursar's Department of Loreto House Education Society of Calcutta, conducts the audit quarterly and annually. The Budget of the institution is prepared annually and presented to the Bursar's Department of Loreto House Education Society of Calcutta. Utilization Certificates for funds received from external sources from the Government, UGC and other external funding bodies are certified by the Internal Auditor.

The Annual Audit of the Loreto College Alumnae Association is prepared by an independent agency under West Bengal Societies Act annually. The Audit Report is read out at the Annual General Meeting.

On the basis of student intake, faculty requirements, library, laboratory and infrastructural requirements, an inventory of funds is generated for each financial year. These are worked out meticulously by the Principal, Accountant and the Bursar of the Society.

Three quotations are submitted by the Departments of Computer, Geography and Psychology for acquiring instruments/ devices for laboratory upgradation. A buy-back policy for redundant devices

ensures optimum utilization of funds. The college has an organized system of management of E-waste.

Efforts are made to explore new avenues for investment with less risk and higher dividends. Enrichment and Add-on-courses tailored to students needs are introduced, which is a means of resource generation.

Vermicompost an integral output of the institution's green initiative. Vermicompost is packed in environmental friendly recyclable packets and sold at college events like Reunion, World Environment Day and Parents Orientation at a nominal cost. This ensures not only sustainable management of the solid waste generated on campus but also income-generation.

Loreto College being a private aided institution, receives grant under the Pay Packet Scheme for the salaries of sanctioned staff. The college requests for funding in accordance with the 2F and 12B UGC status. Upholding the Vision of excellence in higher education, the college has received funds from ICSSR. Sponsors are sought for events conducted in the institution as part of the CSR

Solid waste is managed through the separation of biodegradable wet waste through the use of colour-schemed collection bins yellow and blue. Wet vegetable waste from the Canteen is used to feed earthworms in the vermi-compost troughs. The vermi-compost thus generated is used for the fruit-bearing trees and flowering plants in the campus and sell to stakeholders.

E-Waste is collected in a special labeled wooden box beside the college office and this is disposed off to a collection center. Liquid Waste management is through proper sewerage system to prevent leakage and contamination of waste-bourne diseases. Rainwater run-off steps through a spacious lawn to recharge the deep-water aquifer of underground water table.

Loreto College being a Liberal Arts College does not use hazardous chemicals and radio-active material. Biomedical waste in the form of solid napkins is disposed off by women support staff appropriately. Used face-masks are deposited in a bin on the ground floor of the college to suitable disposal.
